eleven churches in Sinaloa, Nayarit, and surrounding areas. Tony works with La Fuente Ministries in Tepic, Nayarit. Together, they have built twenty two churches and have ministered to around 2500 people on a regular basis!!! They also bring VBS programs to these areas. This summer, they did 19 VBS programs reaching 2,200 kids! Tony is a good teacher at Vanguard Bible Institute which is an accredited university connected with the Christian Life College. Tony Simon and La Fuente's goal is to bring one hundred churches in Nayarit, Jalisco and the surrounding area. Tony and his wife Azucena want to create twenty-five of these churches. They have two children; one named Vanessa, ten and, Andrea, thirteen. Heart 4 Mexico is a new not-for-profit organization Tony and Azucena are starting to raise money to plant even more churches and ministries in Mexico. They have four main pillars for their program. The first is church planting. The second pillar is a home for boys and girls. At the moment, they have 28 kids in foster care. The third pillar is Vanguard Bible School, as previously mentioned above. The last pillar is short-term Mission Teams. Overall, Tony Simon is doing a lot for the kingdom of God, and is making a lot of progress in Mexico.

"San Blas-We officially launched the church in San Blas at the Voga Voga Disco Bar!! On September 10th we had an incredible turnout for the launch of the new church. The work is just beginning. **Tuxpan-**Last year in the town of Tuxpan, Nayarit we began pouring the foundation of the new building. The church in Tuxpan is a thriving congregation and they have been giving bags of cement, block and money to see this project thru."
