


College Sports During COVID



However, they, now known as Pilgrims, were blown off course. They were headed toward Massachusetts, another of the 13 colonies. After two months on the Mayflower, they

landed off the coast of Cape Cod and explored the land, which they named Plymouth. They were in trouble, though, because they had no permission to settle there. And since they arrived in December, things got worse. They did not have time to plant crops. A cold winter, disease, and starvation caused nearly half the colony to die. But despite their hardships, they had much to be thankful for at the end of the rough season. And so do we! We also have a lot to be thankful for during this hard year. 
